**Epiphany** is the day Christians remember the coming of the Magi to visit Jesus, bringing their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

It occurs on January 6 every year, the 13th day of the Christmas season. The word "epiphany," from the Greek word *epiphania*, means appearance or manifestation.

The arrival of these visitors was a sign that the incarnation of God in Christ had been made known and was recognized by the heavens to the whole world, so that even Gentile wise men from the East came to pay him homage. This is an observance of great majesty, solemnity and awe.

An even more ancient Christian celebration than Christmas, Epiphany originally focused on the nativity, God's incarnation (God made flesh) in the birth of Jesus Christ, and Christ's baptism. After the late fourth century, as Advent developed as a season of baptismal preparation in addition to Lent, Epiphany became associated with baptism. This is why we see images of the three Magi on many older baptismal fonts.

In many Hispanic cultures, Epiphany is a day of great rejoicing and celebration, often kicked off by a parade the night before in which people dressed as the three kings or carrying statues of the three kings pass through the towns and villages throwing out candy and small gifts to all around. Families and children alike look forward to *Día de Los Tres Reyes* (Three Kings Day) as a time for presents, feasting and celebration.

In England January 5 is known as Twelfth Night, the culmination of the 12 days of Christmas feasting and partying. On Twelfth Night, many families gather in homes to celebrate with friends, food, singing and gifts. It is at these Twelfth Night celebrations that "Chalking the Door," asking God's blessing on those dwellings and upon all who live there, is most often observed.

We will celebrate Epiphany on Sunday, January 9th.

# Chasing the Wild Goose

Whenever you are asked trivia questions about Christmas remember that there were three gifts of the magi but the Gospels never give us a number of the wise men. This week we celebrate Epiphany - a holiday that is older than Christmas. The church celebrates that the good news of the coming of the Christ Child is not for Israel alone, but for the whole world. Much is made of the gifts the magi bring Jesus. Not practical gifts but symbolic gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. Gold was a gift for a king, frankincense is used in worship and myrrh was used in burial rituals. Very appropriate gifts when you realize Christ will be known as King and God and Sacrifice.

I always wondered what happened to those three or more wise men. Matthew tells us they go home another way. They are warned to not return to Herod. But what happened to them. What did they talk about on the way home, wherever home was?

Hopefully those magi and we return home with a new perspective. We can imagine that what they had seen and heard grew in their lives. The word epiphany often is used in the context of a surprise. Does God still surprise us this time of year? As we start to take down the decorations of the celebration of the Christ Child how do we allow him to grow in our lives? As we are packing up ornaments for next Christmas there is much to unpack in our lives.

Babies change everything and Jesus certainly does. Hopefully we are surprised by the ways he will, if we let him, change our lives. We look at the world differently through the eyes of a child. Children and grandchildren change how we see our priorities.

How often those magi must have thought about those gifts and that child. How surprised they were to find such a child - humble in birth but mighty in justice and love. May the Christmas gift lead us into the wonder and surprises of this season of Epiphany!



Nome Community Center is proud to be over 100 years old, and this mission still rings true today. In its infancy, the mission was born from the hearts of United Methodist women to address the needs of the community of Nome. Nome Community Center continues to strive to fulfill its mission by transforming itself to meet the needs of the community and its people.

Nome Community Center traces its roots to a reindeer-herding project that began in 1906. Mrs. R. H. Young, Bureau Secretary of Alaska, supplied a generous donation to the Women's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Church to establish a reindeer mission at the Sinuk River. The purpose of the mission was to preserve and protect the tradition of reindeer herding.
